## How to get to **Ideford Common** nature reserve

Ideford Common is on the southern edge of the Haldon Hills quite close to the village of Ashcombe. Leave the A380 at the Ashcombe Cross junction and take the B3192 Teignmouth Road. Take the first right (400m after the roundabout) down an unsigned lane. Just as this lane turns sharp left you will see the Ideford Common car park in front of you.
